My father was a sailor and lake racer who prided himself in getting his Penguin dinghy to move even at the lightest of wind conditions. His favorite saying was "there is never a lack of wind, just a lack of patience." As his 9-year-old crew, I would spend countless race days positioned on the lee rail giving the boat that perfect 10 degree heal to keep the sail shaped to catch any



breathe of air. I would watch the dandelion fuzzies float by in the water with my Dad coaching "Be very still Dwight, we have good boat speed."

This exercise in self-control was not easy for a 9-year-old boy but I learned that if I was a good crew on Sunday, I would have a much easier time when I screwed up at Catholic school. The other side benefit of Sunday racing was that I got to skip mass and then promise my Mom that I would tell the priest in confession that I missed mass because I was helping my Dad.

Flash forward to our Summer Racing Series and I frequently longed for the feathery light weight and simplicity of that Penguin. Racing a 9-ton keeled sailboat in ultra-light and variable wind conditions was far more frustrating. We would start a race with nice fresh breezes and good boat speed and then the pack would hit the black hole of A mark and we would end up bobbing in the current going backwards wondering if we could avoid drifting into the mark or the rocks of the jetty.

But that is racing in the South Puget Sound. Congratulations To Chris Caudill and crew of **Solitaire** as their patience and boat handling skills made them a consistent PHRF class winner. Also want to thank Philip Norton aboard **Seabiscuit** and Michael Hamilton aboard **Amidala** who graciously volunteered their time and effort in providing us Race Committee functions in June and July.

It's hard to believe it's already August and our club racing season is winding down. It's been a fun spring and summer as out race fleet has slowly grown to include nine regular boats showing up for our Thursday Night series. Boat For Sale

Longtime member, Jerry Stephenson, has moved to Florida (Margaritaville!) and is selling his boat, Margo, a 33 foot Delphia. Delphia Yachts was founded in Poland in 1990. The quality of the construction and fit and finish are evident and exemplary. The cabinetry is outstanding due to the excellent Polish workmanship. The spars are from Selden with double spreaders and all running rigging led to the cockpit. All Lewmar self-tailing two speed winches were upgrades from the stock boat as well as a folding Volvo three blade propellor in place of the included two blade stock propeller. A windlass with 180' of chain and a Bruce anchor serve as ground tackle. Jerry, the

current and only owner of this 2007 Delphia 33, purchased it from Admiralty Sailboats in Tacoma. S/V Margo has won many races due to its fine design and build and has served as a wonderful, safe cruising boat throughout the Puget Sound, Straits of Georgia, and all areas between. It is unusual for a sailboat of this size to have two separate staterooms. Another nice feature is the dinette with a double seat opposite that can use the saloon table.



The boat was hauled September 2022 and had the bottom and rudder sanded to the gelcoat and painted with three coats of anti-fouling paint. The hull and decks were also polished. The sail inventory includes a full battened main with stack pack, two roller furling Genoas one of which is a rarely used, laminated 135% genoa. A rarely used Asymmetric Spinnaker and a never used carbon fiber spinnaker pole are included.
